An Eye for an Eye - A Talk on Cornea Donation

On the 2nd of September 2019, there was a talk on Cornea donation at The OASIS by Doctor Neeti Gupta, Medical Director and Cornea specialist at AIIMS, Rishikesh.

The talk was mainly about the problem of corneal blindness and eye donation. Eye donation is the donation of the cornea to an eye bank after the death of the donor. These corneas can be used to cure corneal blindness. Corneal blindness is a disease, which affects the transparency of the cornea and leads to blindness. 20% of the blind population of the world resides in India out of which 6-7 million people are suffering from corneal blindness. This corneal blindness can be treated with corneal transplant, which can be done only when people agree to donate their corneas.

There is huge shortage of corneas in India. The corneal collection by the eye banks is only 25% of what is required in India. This is because of myths, old beliefs and a lack of awareness. USA and Sri Lanka are the top 2 exporters of corneas. Anybody can contribute to make India one of the top suppliers of corneas by pledging to donate their eyes after death and by making eye donation a family tradition. Some members of Team OASIS have pledged to spread awareness about this issue and also to donate their corneas.

Mathematics Quiz



Those who are good at Mathematics are truly talented and in order to search for this talent in our school, the Math Department at The OASIS organised an Inter House Math Quiz which was an amazing logical and a calculating contest. Two students from each house took part. The competition was divided into three rounds; the qualifier round, the semi-final and the final round.

The qualifier round decided which team went to the semifinals. There were four teams of which only three would qualify, so the players were all under great pressure. Before the questions were asked, the participants were given chits with numbers written on them and the number decided the turn for the participant. One participant from each team had to go and answer 20 questions in 90 seconds. After the round ended, Mahit House was eliminated and the remaining three houses went on to the semifinal round.

The third round was the algorithm round which had only one contestant from each House. The contestant was given an



algorithm which they had to solve in 90 seconds. These algorithms were not easy to solve but the contestants from Daivik and Vinaya House led their houses into the final round of the Quiz.

The final round had some reasoning questions along with some calculations but here, one wrong answer meant negative marks would be awarded. Daivik House could have easily won the Math Quiz but didn't as most answers that were wrong were negatively marked. Vinaya House emerged as the winner. Mr. Rajeev Chawla was invited to share his experience of teaching Mathematics with the student audience.
