SUPW-FIRE TRAINING

On 9th April 2023, The OASIS held its first SUPW session for the academic year 2023-24. The topic of the session was fire training. This involved an explanation of the different causes of fire and their extinguishment. It demonstrated how to evacuate people from a building on fire, etc.

The SUPW session took place at the school's Yogasthal. The teacher-in-charge was Mr Ajit Bisht. The session started with a brief theoretical introduction to fires. It also covered the different types of fires namely-Type A (Cloth, Wood; Type B(Gasoline, Oil); Type C (Electrical Fires); Type D (Metal fires) and Type K (Kitchen).

These types are lesser known but their knowledge is very important to ensure our safety. The explanation further moved on to discuss the types of fire extinguishers Type A, Type B, etc. The Type D fire extinguisher is considered a universal extinguisher and can deal with all forms of fire. Subsequently, Mr. Ajeet Bisht discussed the important spots to move to in case of a fire at school, a few common ones being the playground and the main gate.

After the theoretical part of the drill, students were asked to move to the Crescent Amphetoria where a practical session was held to demonstrate different techniques one can use to help a person escape from a fire mishap. The students were divided into groups of five to practice these techniques and soon a fun and informative session of students lifting each other ensued. At the end of the session, the working of a fire extinguisher was demonstrated by Mr. Ajit Bisht. The practical included using the extinguisher and determining if it was fit for use or not. A few fortunate students were also given a chance to handle an extinguisher to douse the fire. In the end, the session turned out to be informative and enlightening. This was thoroughly enjoyed by the students at every stage. With that, the first SUPW session came to a memorable end.








THE AWESOME EGYPTIANS

THE OASIS INTER HOUSE SPELLATHON COMPETITION 2023



On Wednesdays, instead of studying in the 3rd school, we have P.A. (Performing Arts) and in the 7th school, we go to the library. Some of the children may think going to the library is monotonous or it is a waste of time but I think it is the best place.

On Saturdays, we follow a different schedule as instead of going home at 4 we go home at 1 o'clock. In place of sports, there is GPVAL which is the 1st school. After GPVAL we have to study for three schools only and then have brunch (breakfast and lunch together). After brunch, we have the Saturday activity. I have opted for Natyashala. After Saturday's activity, we go home. We have to eat lunch at home but at home, I eat only a little bit as my stomach is already full after eating the brunch.

The most amazing moment I had in this school was when, unexpectedly it started raining really hard outside while all the Satva and Ekya children were eating lunch and none of us had an umbrella. We had to run to the academic block for our activity.

The best day in this school was the day I received a certificate as I had participated in the Inter-House Spellathon Competition. This took place on 21st April 2023 and my house, Vinaya, was placed second. It was a day that I shall never forget. I was over the moon as it was the third certificate I had ever got.

Mr. Bathla, the Director and Head of the school, congratulated me and my fellow friends from other houses who received the certificates along with me. All my friends and some of my teachers congratulated me and I felt so proud of myself. I hope I get to participate in such competitions in future too and attain more prizes.




