

(MUN) is an educational simulation where one learns about concepts such as diplomacy, reasoning, and decision-making through debating on
a wide range of problems that have mankind in a chokehold, also providing a variety of perspectives on an issue.

On the 3rd and 4th of May 2023, The OASIS had its first MUN on campus. For many, like me, it was their first experience physically, while
for others it was their first participation; but the one common feeling we shared was excitement, fear, and curiosity.

The topics of the two committees, UNGA (United Nations General Assembly) and UNSC (United Nations Security Council) were 'Mitigating
Global Food Crisis with Special Emphasis on Food Security in Conflict Zones' and 'Resolving Territorial Disputes in the South China Sea'
respectively. Both are issues that pose a significant threat to our lives. The entire MUN experience was a memorable one, and in the end, the
students were even more knowledgeable than before, with stronger opinions and a better outlook on various problems.

United Nations General Assembly-

Throughout the committee sessions, all the delegates were involved in some sort of discussion or debate and provided insight on the issue through the lens of several countries. It would be difficult to distinguish between the newcomers and experienced participants because everyone raised their voices, expressed their thoughts, and attempted to actively participate in the sessions.

Solutions were highlighted, as were a number of obstacles, and each student acted the way the nations would have- supporting allies, and fighting for the interests of their people.

Overall, the delegates attempted to work together to tackle the global problem at hand, and while some did not see eye-to-eye on certain matters, that is simply how things operate in the real world where what is right for one, may not be right for the other. However, the entire procedure, in my opinion, represented the spirit and working of a UNGA committee. In the end, the committee was fruitful, as one of the draft resolutions created was passed by a majority vote of the members.

Some did better than others and the rest had greater scope for improvement; those who won positions were Jaaniya Kaur Arora (Russia)- "Best Delegate", Deepsimar Kaur (Yemen)- "High Commendation" and Ayushi Tripathi (Syria)- "Special Mention".

International Press Corps-

Today, one receives news about what is going on around the world through various sources, it can be on their televisions or mobile phones, but who provides this news to the masses? The answer to this question, is the reporters and journalists of the various news agencies. This frequently overlooked line of work, for this reason, is incredibly important, and at the MUN, the IPC reporters, including myself, got just a small taste of what it's like to be a reporter. The "Best Reporter" position was bagged by Jigyasa Kukreti, Tara Kumar (Agence France Presse) won "High Commendation," and Mouli Panwar (Xinhua News Agency) received "Special Mention."



United Nations Security Council-

All the committee sessions of the United Nations Security Council (UNSC) were really heated. Each session had one or more than one argument which sometimes did get resolved or the chair had to stop the delegates from arguing any further. As the agenda was completely based on China's wrongdoing in the South China Sea, China was targeted by almost all the countries including the United States of America, France, Taiwan, and many more.

The committee sessions of the UNSC were filled with crises and crisis updates. The delegates worked really hard to solve the crisis but unfortunately were not able to do so because of the difficulty level of the crisis.

The last UNSC committee session ends when the Draft Resolutions (DRs) made by any of the blocs pass. The blocs consisted of Bloc-1 China and its allies and Bloc-2 USA and its allies. The DR of Bloc-1 (China) did not pass because of the lack of votes, so the DR of Bloc-2 (USA) had the chance to pass but China voted against it during the voting using its Veto power resulting in the failure of Block-2's DR. As no DR was passed, the committee failed and was adjourned.

Aveer Prakash (Australia) was announced "Best Delegate"; Gauri Juyal (France) received "High commendation" and Deepjyoti Negi (United States of America) received "Special Mention".

Sharnagat is home to over a hundred dogs, including stray, disabled, and abandoned dogs. Other than dogs, they also house birds, a bull, and a donkey. They provide love and care to all these animals, and so can we, by volunteering or donating.

What I adored most about Sharnagat was that everyone there paid great attention to every animal. They knew their names and their entire journey from when they first came to the shelter. The affection that the dogs get from the workers can be seen in their interaction with them. It was a day before my class X board examination results, and naturally, I was feeling anxious, but in the few hours that I got to spend at Sharnagat, I felt a lot more comfortable.

A study published in the monthly newsletter from the National Institutes of Health (part of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services) states that interacting with animals has been shown to decrease levels of cortisol, which is a stress-related hormone, and lower blood pressure.

The day consisted of playing with the dogs, grooming them, and feeding them. All in all, it was a day spent well. We are grateful to Mrs. Neha Negi for welcoming us and sharing her joy with us.

I stared hard and waited that vision to come, But all I saw was my own face, and the water glistening in the sun.




