



Chefs of Satva were briefed to prepare and present their dishes within 45 minutes and Ekya within 75 minutes.


All cooking materials were to be brought by chefs.

On 13th of October, as part of the Science Fest celebrations, the students of classes X, XI (Science) and XII (Science) visited the Wadia Institute of Himalayan Geology, Dehradun, accompanied by Mrs. Anshu Garg, Mr. Ravinder Bhrigu, Mrs. Meenakshi Sharma Kagdee, Mr. Gaurav Kumar and Mrs. Jyoti Hora. It is a natural resources research institute for the study of Geology of the Himalayas under the Department of Science and Technology, Ministry of Science and Technology, Government of India.

It prides itself on its extensive collection of rock and fossil samples and the students had the privilege of exploring the fascinating facets of geology with skilled guides who educated the students about the various minerals found in Himalayan region such as quartz, sulphur, among others. The guides also elucidated on the three types of rocks- igneous, sedimentary and metamorphic, and their formations. The students also learnt about the evolution of the Earth on the geological timeline, including the development of life and formation of various continents and other physical features.

The chief exhibit of interest was the wonderful fossil collection which included incisors and skull cap of Homo erectus and a fossil of dinosaur eggs. The students also had the opportunity to see the magnetotelluric survey seismograph and were shown the data collected by the stations near Joshimath, prior to the recent Nepal earthquake by a seismograph analyst. The Wadia Institute complex also houses a seismograph observatory and an electron microscope. Another intriguing exhibit was a piece of ancient rock which had a drop of water trapped inside it and this water droplet could be seen moving inside when the crystal was moved.







Nature is a powerful force and human activities are influencing its natural course, causing adverse impacts on the environment. The growing impact is concerning and thus better understanding of our environment is much needed within the people. The trip to the Wadia Institute of Himalayan Geology was a wonderful and educational experience for the students which enriched their understanding of the landscape of the Earth, especially the Himalayan mountains that surround us.







"SCIENCE IS A WAY OF LIFE."

The OASIS, on the 13th of October organised a Science Educational Trip for the students of classes IX and X, as well as the science students of classes XI and XII. Students of class IX were routed to The Subir Raha Oil Museum at Oil and Natural Gas Corporation, and on arrival were given a brief introduction by an ONGC officer on the subject of its numerous geology, branches, the history of the museum and ONGC and its operations.

There was a lovely display of various types of inventory outside the museum, and inside, there were various sections and rooms where we were given an informative, rich and holistic tour on how oil is formed, the various methods used to detect it, an in-depth explanation on how an oil industry works, the various challenges, the industry faces, how oil is refined and effectively distributed, and finally, ways to conserve it. We additionally educated were about the history of oil discovery in India and the individuals who made it possible. Life without oil is practically unimaginable but have we ever thought about the elaborate process behind its recovery?



By invoking this question in everyone's minds and answering it, we could not help but appreciate the people engaged in obtaining this 'black gold', and developed an interest and deep understanding of a rather 'mundane' yet fundamental aspect of human life.

After all, Mahatma Gandhi himself stated "Knowledge gained through experience is far superior and many times more useful than bookish knowledge".



MILITARY HISTORY SEMINAR

On the 5th and 6th of October, The OASIS participated in the Military History Seminar hosted by the Welham Boys' School, Dehradun. Over the course of six captivating sessions, we embarked on an illuminating journey through the annals of time.

The event commenced with the grandeur of the Opening Ceremony which was also the first session of the seminar known as **'Left, Right and Centre'**. This session was a question and answer round with Lt. Gen. Gurmit Singh (His Excellency Governor of Uttarakhand) with Mr. Shiv Kunal Verma being the moderator. The discussion was further focused on the Assam regiment, Siachen Glacier, China and other such interesting topics.

The second session or the first syndicate, "The Blurred Lines between Epics and History" started off with delegates from eight schools sharing their views on the topic. The Indian epics; The Ramayana and the Mahabharata, Delhi The Sultanate, The Vijayanagara and Empire, of emergence Buddhism and Jainism were some of the topics that were discussed by the delegates. Further the panel guests, the moderator- Kajari Kamal, Vice Admiral Pradeep Chauhan, Lt. Gen. Harinder Singh and Dr. Sanjeev Chopra, discussed the topic in depth.

After lunch, the delegates were prepared for the third session, 'Medieval Period'. The panel guests for the session were; Moderator- Mr. Shiv Kunal Verma, Lt. General K. J. Singh, Col. Ajay K. Raina and Mr. Sai Deepak Jayakumar. World War I, The Mughal Empire, The 1857 Uprising were a few of the topics that were discussed during this session. The delegates' speeches covered both the advantages and disadvantages of India's medieval era. The panel of guests also discussed the drawbacks of the Mughal Empire and described how cruel the Mughals were.

This session was focused on the topic, 'Impact of Colonialism'. The moderator of this session was Major General Jagatbir Singh. The resource personnels of this session Vice Admiral were Pradeep Chauhan, Major General Yash Mor and AVM Arjun Subramaniam. After the delegates presented their impressive speeches, Vice Admiral Pradeep Chauhan presented an engrossing presentation where he quoted "History is not boring, historians are boring", which lit up the audience. He further delved into the Battle of Diu and its importance.

This session was known as the 'Watershed years.' This session was based on the wars which took place from the year 1947 to 1971. Delegates expressed their views on several topics such as The Indo-Pak War of 1965, the clash at Nathu La in 1967, The Bangladesh War of Liberation 1971. The panelists shared their perspectives on the 1962 Sino-Indian Conflict, delving into the reasons behind India's loss in the war. As the session progressed, each panelist recounted their individual encounters and insights. The event culminated with the panelists imparting a few words of wisdom to the audience.



As the seminar drew to a close, we gathered for the final session, the closing ceremony which included a discussion featuring the Chief Guest, Lt. Gen. K. T. Parnaik, alongside Mr. Darshan Singh and Moderator Shiv Kunal Verma. The session was aptly titled, 'Appreciation for the future'. The session delved into China's strategic focus on non-military means to exert influence on other nations, as well as the global presence of companies collecting extensive information on various countries. Following this enlightening session, a video crafted by the students of Welham Boys' School showcased the events of the two days. The seminar was infused with enjoyable elements, including a lively band performance that added a musical flair to the event. A photograph of all attendees was taken to cherish the wonderful memories. There was also an art exhibition on the topic 'Integrating India.'

The seminar was quite informative and meaningful. The seminar covered a few of the major topics from ancient history and the medieval period to colonialism to the wars. 


 बिना पैर चलती रहती, हाथों से मुँह को पोंछती।
