














"JAIPUR AND RANTHAMBORE: A JOURNEY THROUGH TIME"

Later in the day, we returned to Jaipur, where we visited the serene Birla Temple, admiring its white marble architecture and beautiful carvings. The day ended with a visit to Chokhi Dhani, The Ethnic Village, where we indulged in the local Rajasthani cuisine for dinner. We enjoyed shopping for fragrances, clothing, and even street food.
